Conflict of Interest

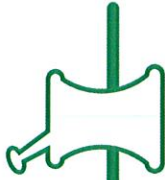
All speakers will disclose affiliations or conflicts of interest at the beginning of their respective talks.

The procedure represents a formal mechanism whereby any pharmacist or technician may obtain a review of a complaint of unfair treatment. A pharmacist must file the grievance in writing within 30 days of the incident generating the complaint. The complaint will be reviewed by the Director of Continuing Pharmacy Education and every effort will be made to resolve the problem of the complainant. If the complaint is not satisfactorily resolved, the complaint will be forwarded to the UAMS COP Dean for disposition.
