In the 92nd General Assembly, Senator Hammer sponsored Senate Bill 520 (now Act 994), a landmark bill that prohibits spread pricing, sets a payment floor for ingredient cost payments to pharmacies, requires PBMs to report manufacturer rebates, and closes loopholes on the definition of Maximum Allowable Cost, among other things.

Senator Hammer is a member of the Benton Booster Club, Reward Sports Ministries, and First Baptist Church Benton and has previously served as Director of Reward Saints and Regional Director of Arkansas Counseling Association. Professionally, he is pastor and hospice chaplain. Senator Hammer earned a Bachelor of Arts in Biblical Counseling from Trinity College of the Bible in Newburgh, Indiana. Tery earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from Arkansas Tech University, and a Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmacy and Doctor of Pharmacy from UAMS College of Pharmacy. He held numerous leadership positions, including Treasurer and Trustee for the American Pharmacists Association and Past President and Board Member for the APhA Foundation for many years beginning when he was a student. He holds the record for longest serving APhA Board member in the organization’s 167-year history.

Tery was the Founder, President, and CEO of RxResults. Prior to RxResults, Tery served as the COO and CMO for NMHC, President of Pharmacy Associates, Inc., and served on numerous boards and federal task forces related to health care reform.

Tery’s life was blessed by his wife Mary, daughter Julie Lewis and her husband Randy, and son Jeff. Mary attended the ceremony and accepted the award on behalf of Tery’s family.
